Merrill Tool Holding Company Invests \$6.5 Million

Roots: Merrill Tool Holding Company, est. 1968

Future: Two Merrill Tool Holding Company subsidiaries are expanding for a combined investment of \$6.5 million. Merrill Fabricators, Inc. is constructing a new facility in Buena Vista Charter Township, while Merrill Tool & Machine Inc. has added new manufacturing space and equipment in the village of Merrill.

Merrill Fabricators produces plate and tubing, steel and aluminum machine tool bases and related parts, stairways and platforms. The company invested \$2.95 million in a new 17,000 sq. ft. facility at 3010 Holland Ave. in Buena Vista. Merrill Fabricators, with a location in the city of Saginaw, hired five new employees and retained 12 employees. SFI was able to assist the company and the community with an investment incentive and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) approved a Brownfield Single Business Tax credit.

Merrill Tool added 20,000 sq. ft. of manufacturing space and new equipment to its facility on 21659 W. Gratiot Rd. in the village of Merrill. The company, which fabricates machine components for special machine builders, created 15 new jobs. Merrill Tool benefitted from funding from the Saginaw County Revolving Loan Fund,

which is administered by SFI, along with an

investment incentive.

Merrill Fabricators's new facility is located on 3010 Holland Ave. in Buena Vista Charter Township.



Hausbeck Pickle Expands in City of Saginaw

Roots: Hausbeck Pickle Company Inc., est. 1923

Future: Hausbeck Pickle Company Inc. has expanded its facilities to a city of Saginaw location with a \$1.4 million investment. An additional \$2.025 million is expected to be invested in new equipment and facility development.

The company specializes in brining and processing of pickles and peppers, with Burger King and Subway being two of its major clients. Hausbeck Pickle had been researching and considering expansion sites and investment incentives in Saginaw County. Its search also included Michigan's southern border communities along with Indiana in order to reduce transportation costs.



"Because of an increasingly competitive market, it was necessary to take a look at a number of options for Hausbeck to continue to grow," said Tim Hausbeck, general manager of Hausbeck Pickle Company Inc. "The city of Saginaw, the MEDC and Saginaw Future worked together to develop a competitive package for this expansion project to be located in Saginaw County."

Hausbeck eventually chose the former Gallade' Technologies building located in a Renaissance Zone in the city of Saginaw. The company is currently using the facility for warehousing but intends to construct an additional 40,000 sq. ft. manufacturing building on the site. Hausbeck's expansion will result in 34 jobs retained and 10 created.

SFI assisted Hausbeck Pickle with site location assistance, investment incentives and facilitated meetings with the city of Saginaw. The MEDC also approved a Single Business Tax credit.

Duro-Last Expands World Headquarters Offices

Duro-Last Roofing, Inc., est. 1981 Roots:

Future: Duro-Last, Roofing, the world's largest manufacturer of prefabricated roofing systems, is adding 18,000 sq. ft. The company is renovating and expanding offices at its world headquarters in Buena Vista Charter Township.

The project is required due to the company's increased sales and staff growth over the last several years. The high-tech, two-story expansion includes renovations to the existing structure's facade and offices.



According to Duro-Last President Tom Hollingsworth, Duro-Last has experienced an 8.5% increase in employees in Saginaw and a 13.2% increase in sales nationwide over the last year. "Based on our projections, we anticipate the addition of 61 new positions at our headquarters facility over the next 12 to 24 months," said Hollingsworth.

The addition and renovations will also more professionally accommodate the numerous plant tours that $\mathsf{Duro} ext{-}\mathsf{Last}$ hosts for contractors, sales representatives and prospective customers from throughout the United States and Canada. "We take great pride in showcasing our operation to prospective customers and feel that our expansion and renovations will present a world-class facility," stated Hollingsworth.

Saginaw Future assisted Duro-Last and the community with an investment incentive package that was approved by Buena Vista Charter Township and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation. The company was also awarded an

Economic Development Job Training grant to train new and existing employees and a State Education Tax incentive.

Duro-Last is a national roofing manufacturer with locations in Oscoda, Michigan; Grants Pass, Oregon; Jackson, Mississippi; and Sigourney, Iowa.

Medical Manufacturer Continues to Expand

Roots: Unique Instruments, Inc., est. 1977

Future: Unique Instruments is a local success story in the growing biotech market. The company invested \$8.95 million in new equipment to increase production at its Saginaw County facility.

The company is a medical device manufacturer that specializes in surgical cutting accessories, instruments and implants. Unique Instruments, established in 1977, added capacity through leased space in Buena Vista Charter Township, which will more than double its size. The company hired 90 new employees in 2005, due to the expansion.

Saginaw Future facilitated meetings with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation and local government resulting in a State Education Tax incentive, as well as a local investment incentive.



Unique produces a number of instruments used in various medical procedures, such as spinal implants and bone screws, surgical drill bits for dental and sports medicine procedures and surgical blades for total knee replacement surgery.

Unique Instruments has a number of certifications, such as, ISO Class 7 Certified (Class 10,000) Clean Room, ISO 9001:2000 Certified Quality System and ISO 13485:2003. Unique is also registered by the Food and Drug Administration. This is the second recent investment for Unique. The company invested over \$2 million in 2003, for the transfer of equipment to its Bridgeport facility, which resulted in the hiring of nine people.

Hemlock Semiconductor Invests in Future

Roots: Hemlock Semiconductor Corporation (HSC), est. 1979

Future: Hemlock Semiconductor will invest \$500 million in a two-phase expansion of its operations in Thomas Township. The project will create 300 new jobs. Assistance offered through the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), local government, and community and state organizations helped convince the company to choose Michigan over a competing U.S. site.

Hemlock Semiconductor was formed as a wholly owned subsidiary of Dow Corning Corporation in 1979. In 1984, the company formed a joint venture with two of Japan's largest silicon wafer manufacturers, Shin-Etsu Handotai Company Limited and Mitsubishi Materials Corporation. HSC is the world's leading producer of polycrystalline silicon, used to produce solar energy and various electronic devices for the semiconductor industry.

"Hemlock Semiconductor's decision to choose Michigan over Kentucky is a testament to the state's leadership in competitive-edge technologies and will create jobs in the high-tech field of alternative energy investment and research," said Governor Jennifer M. Granholm.

The MEDC approved a Single Business Tax credit valued at more than \$5.1 million over 15 years to win the project. Thomas Township

STRONG TECHNOLOGY STRONG FUTURE and the city of Saginaw partnered to propose a 30-year investment incentive worth an estimated \$52 million. A University of Michigan economic analysis estimates the company's expansion will generate 313 indirect Michigan jobs as a result of increased economic activity, in addition to the 300 jobs created directly by the company and its contracting agency. The project is expected to generate more than half a billion dollars in personal income for Michigan workers over the life of the incentive.

New Facility for Citizens Bank & Tri-City Urology

Roots: Citizens Bank, est. 1871; Tri-City Urology P.C., est. 1997

Future: Saginaw's medical sector continues to grow with the addition of the Riverfront Medical Arts Condominiums, a new medical and professional office building. The \$2.8 million facility will be located at the corner of Atwater St. and S. Washington Ave., adjacent to the Michigan CardioVascular Institute. The state of Michigan provided funding support for the project through the MEDC's Core Communities Fund.



Citizens Bank, which currently operates a branch on the site, will be one of two anchor tenants in the 20,000 sq. ft. Medical Arts Condominiums. "Citizens Bank has a long-standing presence in Downtown Saginaw and it is very important to continue that presence by providing services to our customers at a quality banking facility," said Gary Glaza, regional president of Citizens Bank. "The new state-of-the-art branch will benefit our customers, at the same time it becomes another step in the rebuilding of our great city."



Anchor tenant, Tri-City Urology P.C., is made up of five physicians that specialize in the medical and surgical treatment of male and female urinary tract problems, and the male reproductive system. "The location is perfectly situated between two major regional hospitals that will allow us to better serve our patients," said Dr. Steven L. Jensen, president of Tri-City Urology P.C.

STRONG MEDICAL STRONG FUTURE

The city of Saginaw helped lay the foundation for the project when it assisted the development of the site in 2001, through the establishment of a Renaissance Zone, closing portions of Water St., rewriting parking ordinances and providing demolition funds. Downtown Area Development LLC II and SSP Associates, Inc. are the developers of the site.

New Freeland Shopping Center



Roots: Freeland Village Center, est . 2006

Future: Tittabawasse Township's village of Freeland will soon be benefiting from a \$2.5 million downtown shopping center.

Freeland Development LLC acquired a former auto dealership and a blighted retail center, and are redeveloping the site on Freeland's Midland Street/M-47.

The plan calls for two retail shopping centers with space for up to 16 merchants. The structural design includes ground-level architectural block, stylized facades and overhangs for pedestrians.

Approximately 50 jobs are expected to be created by the project that will provide additional shopping for Freeland's growing population. Careful attention had to be taken in order to address site location challenges, cost feasibility and integration with the developing Freeland Downtown area.

The site sits on a section of M-47 that has a substantial daily traffic count, with a posted speed limit of 45 mph and no street parking.

These challenges led to the plan that placed the buildings back from the state highway, along with development of landscaping and greenbelt that will be aesthetically appropriate for the location. There will be no signage adjacent to M-47, instead uniform lettering will be placed on the building's facade.

Construction of the Freeland Village Center began in December 2005.

New Location for Lafarge



Roots: Lafarge North America, est .1909

Future: Lafarge Midwest, a subsidiary of Lafarge North America, purchased and refitted the former Alchem building in the city of Zilwaukee.

Lafarge North America is a cement manufacturer with locations throughout Michigan and the United States. The company, with a terminal in Carrollton Township, added to its Saginaw County presence with its new Zilwaukee location.

The company has redeveloped the building into a distribution center for its cement products. Lafarge invested \$2.8 million in the long-vacant building on Adams St. The easy I-75 access was an important factor in selecting the location.


The new investment will result in the creation of two new jobs and the retention of five jobs. Saginaw Future assisted the company and the community with investment incentive packaging.

Lafarge North America, together with its subsidiaries, is the largest supplier of cement and a leading ready-mixed concrete supplier in North America. The company is also one of the top four producers of construction aggregate (crushed stone, sand and gravel) and a leading manufacturer of gypsum drywall.

Lafarge products are used in the construction of roads, offices, factories and hospitals, just to name a few.

Schuch Hotel Open For Business



Roots: Perry's Schuch Hotel, est . 1868

Future: Local businessman, Mike Perry, has brought new life to a historic building in Old Saginaw City. Perry purchased and renovated the Schuch Hotel that was originally built in 1868.

The building, renamed Perry's Schuch Hotel, houses a restaurant and bar on the main level, which held a grand opening in August 2005.

Perry invested \$500,000 in the redevelopment project, with much of the renovation work being done by himself. Approximately 40 employees staff Perry's Schuch Hotel, which is known for "upscale casual dining."

Future plans call for the renovation of the building's upper levels and development of loft apartments, which will also add to the growing Old Saginaw City area.

Saginaw Future Inc. assisted the project and the city of Saginaw with the pursuit of suitable parking and an environmental assessment.

The most notable owner of the historic hotel was the Schuch family who purchased the building in 1912. John P. Schuch, who helped run the business with his father, was a Saginaw County sheriff, state senator and a founder of the Saginaw Valley Historical Society. Despite name changes over the years, the building has been commonly referred to as the Schuch Hotel.

New Dow Corning Microbial Lab



Roots: Dow Corning Healthcare Industries Materials Site (HIMS), est. 1964

Future: Dow Corning HIMS, located in Thomas Township, is currently constructing a new microbial testing lab, which will assist in product development. The company is also purchasing new mixing equipment and software.

HIMS is the only Dow Corning site dedicated to supplying products to the heath care industry.

These products are used by customers around the world to manufacture a wide variety of heath care products, including pharmaceutical tubing, pacemaker leads, drug-delivery patches (nicotine patches), ports & IV sets, home diagnostic kits for renal patients, anti-gas antifoams and many other applications.

SFI was able to assist the community and Dow Corning HIMS with an investment incentive. Three jobs will be retained due to the project and there are approximately 150 employees at the location.

In December 2005, Governor Jennifer M. Granholm toured the facility and spoke on the 21st Century Job Fund, which is a \$2 billion program to foster investment in high-tech industries.

STRONG MEDICAL STRONG FUTURE

Government Contracts and Export Assistance

The Saginaw Future Inc. Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) continues to support Saginaw County and regional businesses with contracting opportunities and reaching new markets. Those opportunities include federal, state and local government contracts.

During 2005, the Saginaw Future PTAC helped area companies win a total of 195 government contracts with a total value of more than \$5.5 million.

Consultation on exporting products and/or services internationally is also provided. The Saginaw Future PTAC continues to focus on educating businesses on the importance of being competitive in an open market by sponsoring seminars and providing technical assistance. The PTAC sponsored or co-sponsored eight seminars that were designed to assist local companies by expanding company markets and pursuing new opportunities. These opportunities may lie in sales to foreign markets or by doing business with the local, state and/or federal government. The PTAC will offer similar seminars in 2006.

Area Companies Win Government Contracts



Licensed by General Electric, J M Kusch Inc. is a one-stop sourcing supplier for General Electric, which is a supplier for Boeing and Douglass commercial aircraft. The company, located in Bay County, specializes in tooling, lifting fixtures, transportation equipment and stands.

Kusch is a designated U.S. Government Woman Owned Small Business that began operations in 1979. In 2005, the company was awarded numerous government related contracts. SFI markets Saginaw County at various events throughout the state and country, ranging from industry tradeshows to state coordinated site consultant seminars. The purpose of these events is to increase the image and awareness of Saginaw County, and attract new investment. As follow up to these events, SFI provides site consultants and corporate executives with packages to learn more about the benefits of a Saginaw County location.

SFI also runs advertisements in local, regional and national publications, the majority focus on facility development and expansion activities.
